

## 15<sup>th</sup> Institute on Teaching and Mentoring Held in Tampa

The Compact for Faculty Diversity Institute on Teaching and Mentoring was held in Tampa, Florida, October 23-26, 2008. This was the 15<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the Institute. At the first Institute there were 107 attendees; this year over 1,100 attended representing the largest gathering in

America of racial/ethnic minority Ph.D. scholars seeking faculty careers in academia. Scholars from the following programs attended the Institute: Alfred P. Sloan Foundation Minority Ph.D. Program; National Institute of General Medical Sciences (BRIDGES); National Science Foundation Alliances for Graduate Education and the Professoriate Program (AGEP); Social, Behavioral and Economic Sciences (SBE); Gates Millennium Scholars Program; Southern Regional Education Board Doctoral Scholars Program (SREB); New England Region Scholars; and the Ronald E. McNair Postbaccalaureate Achievement Program.

The Institute addresses the minority faculty shortage by providing racial/ethnic minority students with support to pursue doctoral degrees and become college professors. The Institute focuses on increasing the percentage of minority students who earn doctorates and helps diversify the pool of qualified candidates for faculty positions at colleges and universities.
